Ashworth Bartle, director, at Verizon Hall in the newly built Kimmel Performing Arts Center

-Owen Burdick's sacred anthem "Lord, What is Man," for chorus and organ to be premiered by St. Thomas Choir of Men and Boys, Gerre Hancock, Director, accompanied by John Weaver, organ

-Douglas Major's "Love Poem to God," a sacred anthem for choir, organ and synthesizer to be premiered by the Roval School of Church Music. As with most aspects of this year's convention, the planners did not stop with the expected. In addition to the commissions listed above, the work commissioned by the

Philadelphia AGO Chapter for its 100th anniversary, Jennifer Higdon's "Ceremonies" will be performed during the Gathering Convention Celebration on Monday, July 1. There's more! The six compositions in The Philadelphia Organ Book will be presented during the convention by David Higgs in his Repertoire Enrichment sessions or premiered in recitals by the Rising Star organists, which will precede worship services during the week. The book, to be published by the Theodore Presser Music Company of Philadelphia, will be available for purchase at the convention. First Lutheran Carlisle Celebrates 100 Years

GOD IS HERE, a Hymn Festival celebrating the 100th

Anniversary of the First Lutheran Church building, will take place on Sunday, April 14, at 4 p.m. as the first event of the Fine Arts at First Spring Series.

The hymn festival will be lead by Wayne L. Wold, Lutheran organist and noted writer. Mr. Wold is the Director of Chapel Music at Camp David. He is also a member of the music

faculty at Hood College in Frederick, Maryland. Mr. Wold is a prolific composer of hymns and instrumental and choral works. Well-known for his energetic leadership of congregational song and organ improvisations, he is in demand across the country to lead hymn festivals.

Mr. Wold will lead the festival choir and congregation in songs of praise from the church's newly refurbished 55-rank Aeolian-Skinner organ. The massed choir will be comprised of

choristers from local congregations who are ecumenical partners of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.

After nine months of renovation to its worship space, First Lutheran Church is pleased to again reopen its doors to the public for Fine Arts events. The historic sanctuary's beautiful architecture has been enhanced by improved lighting and sound systems. A restroom is now situated in the narthex, and improved handicap accessibility will offer greater ease of entrance for everyone through the front doors.

Following tradition, the *Fine Arts at First* event is free of charge with a freewill offering received. A reception in the Martin Luther Room will follow where an exhibit from the church archives will be on display. Complimentary booklets containing a brief history of the church building by Donald K. Roeder, MD, will be available.

The *Fine Arts Spring Series* will continue with The American Boy Choir from Princeton, New Jersey, in concert on Sunday, May 19, at 4 p.m.


