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From the Dean

We often hear horror stories about organists and clergy in deep conflict and so seldom we hear about all of the clergy musician teams that have good relationships. In all the many positions I have had since junior high before coming to LVC, I have been fortunate to have had great relationships with the clergy members of the churches I served. If I could write a list of special personality and leadership traits that a musicians dream for in their pastor, the head pastor at my last position in Iowa City perhaps had them all. Since it was a full time position, I had interactions with the pastor in every meeting and daily activity. We had different philosophical and religious beliefs at times but we always worked well together.

We were asked to speak to our local AGO group for a meeting called "Clergy and Musician Relationships." We both had colleagues in working relationships with tensions. In fact, in one such case, one of my best friends was the musician at the church and one of his best friends at the church was the pastor (both were easy going "nice" people). As we discussed our upcoming speech and the dilemma of our friends, we discussed what was "right" about our relationship and what had gone "wrong" with theirs. We finally decided that the two basic elements that were most important were open communication and a respect for the other's expertise. The pastor had complete respect for my areas of expertise and let me use my talents to the fullest without trying to micromanage me. In return, I was careful to hear his concerns and tried to listen openly without letting his criticism or ideas become "personal slams" to me.

This month our meeting is devoted to celebrating the pastor-musician relationship. You can read all about the program on page 5 of the newsletter. Invite your pastor to attend with you. What is a non-organist doing in the AGO? That's a question I am asked frequently and although the answer is not difficult, it is multifaceted. ELLA FORSYTH, clarinetist, will present a concert of celebrated works for clarinet as the fourth program in the *Fine Arts at First Series* at First Lutheran Church, corner of High and Bedford streets in Carlisle, on Sunday, February 18, at 3 p.m. Assisted by the John Eaken String Quartet and pianist, Gloria Whitney, the Chamber Music Ensemble will perform Mozart's trio K. 498 known as the "Kegelstatt", an early Beethoven trio, op. 11, and the Brahms masterpiece, quintet op. 115.

Ella Forsyth, a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory, has had many years experience as an orchestral clarinetist and chamber music participant with West Coast ensembles. In addition, she played principal clarinet with the Mexico City Opera and Ballet Orchestra from 1978 to 1981.

The author of *Building a Chamber Music Collection*, Ms. Forsyth is devoted to exploring small ensemble repertoire which includes clarinet. Since coming to central Pennsylvania in 1981, she has presented numerous chamber music recitals with local colleagues, performing often as the Lydian Ensemble. Among her other musical activities have been solo appearances with the Dickinson College Community Orchestra, Dickinson College Symphonic Band, Harrisburg Concert Band, West Shore Symphony, and Central Pennsylvania Symphony.

Ms. Forsyth, a Carlisle resident, currently teaches clarinet at Bucknell University. She is president of the Musical Arts Club of Carlisle and a member of the Harrisburg Wednesday Club.

Violette Cassel died on November 8, 1974. She was a resident of Mt. Gretna and a member of the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. In her will and testament, she bequeathed to this chapter a monetary sum to "produce income paid annually to deserving and talented pupils designated by the Board of AGO". This gift allowed for our chapter to hold yearly organ competitions to determine the winner to whom this scholarship should be given. Some years later, a second prize was created from a donation from Harold J. Stahle, Jr.
