State Commits to Forum Organ Repairs

There is encouraging news to report regarding the condition of the Möller organ in the Forum Auditorium. In May, the Hagerstown Organ Company examined the organ and determined that the console had failed. It had multiple air leaks, and, as a result, only the swell division was playable. Several hours and numerous paper towels and pieces of duct tape later, the organ is now playable, although certain couplers and other controls are inoperable.

Hagerstown presented two estimates to the State. The first, costing \$10,000, would rebuild the console by re-leathering all the necessary components. The second estimate, costing \$60,000, would rebuild the console with all new solid state action, a multi-level memory system, and a new solid state relay system.

The State has committed to the releathering of the console, restoring the console to complete working order before June of 2001. Attempts will be made to budget the

remaining funds to complete the solid state project in the next fiscal year. The State plans to continue with a yearly maintenance and tuning contract.

This is a big commitment on the part of the Department of General Services. I would encourage you to send letters of thanks to Gary Crowell, Secretary of General Services, 515 North Office Building, Harrisburg, PA 17125.

We as a guild now have a responsibility to see that the organ is played and does not fall back into disrepair. The State wants the organ used. After repairs are completed I urge you to call Fuller Runyan, Forum Manager at 717-783-9100, to arrange for practice time on the instrument. I know there may have been some difficulties in the past, but that is "in the past."

I will keep you posted as progress continues on this instrument.

Pipes Spectacular! - The World's Largest Organ Concert

PIPES SPECTACULAR!—The World's Largest Organ Concert—will be a unique celebration of the organ in America that will increase appreciation for the enduring majesty of the "King of Instruments" while re-focusing public attention on the importance of music education, particularly for young people, and the arts in our culture.

With over 200 concert events across the country on a single day—Sunday October 15, 2000-PIPES SPECTACULAR! is expected to attract a family audience of 100,000 nationwide to hear over 2,000 performers in programs featuring the organ with dance companies, brass and other instrumental ensembles, acclaimed choral groups and vocal soloists, marching bands and other musical organizations. Concerts will be presented in urban, suburban and rural communities throughout the United States and in a diverse array of settings-from performing arts centers and concert halls to churches, universities and outdoor pavilions. In addition to the great variety of instruments and performers presented with the organ, programs will feature "informances," organ "crawls," multimedia presentations, and audiovisual enhancements.

The events comprising The World's Largest Organ Concert will feature the organ in its historic and evolving roles as a solo, accompanying and ensemble instrument—showcasing the talents of the nation's leading professional organists in collaboration with some of the country's most distinguished musical artists. The organists are members of the American Guild of Organists (AGO), the national professional association serving the organ and choral music fields, which is organizing the event as a follow-up to its 1996 "World's Largest Organ Recital". That celebration, with hundreds of simultaneous performances nationwide that commemorated the Centenary of the AGO's founding, became the most successful community outreach effort in the history of the organ.

"The scale of participation by AGO members and the richness of programmatic output is reflective of the desire to entertain and inform the widest audience possible," notes John W. Obetz, SMD, AGO National Councillor for Finance and Development. "We intend to engage new audiences for the organ while giving seasoned listeners a fresh perspective on its expansive repertoire. We also hope to communicate the importance of music and arts education

The World's Largest Organ Concert is being produced within a structure of four event categories. Signature events will anchor the national celebration with three programs, one on each coast and one in the Midwest: An exploration of the organ with singers, brass and synthesizer will take place at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C.; an appearance by world-renowned artist and television personality Diane Bish, will encompass a program with



the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra Chorus at the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts in Milwaukee, WI; and three different concert events in San Diego, CA -- at the Spreckels Organ Pavilion, St. Paul's Cathedral and the First United Methodist Mission Valley Church -- will feature the organ with brass, the San Diego Youth Audience (dance and singing) and the San Diegito Orchestra.

A Flagship event will take place on Sunday, October 8, at The Riverside Church in New York, NY, and feature an all-star cast of performers in a tribute to one of the most famous organists of the 20th century, Virgil Fox. This concert will preview the national event of a week later and honor Fox, a prolific concert and recording artist, at the twentieth anniversary of his death.

Twenty-five AGO Chapters have been designated Champion Chapters for their exceptional programmatic creativity, partnerships with other organizations, and use of the concert format to attract and engage the audience -particularly youth. These Champions are part



Smithsonian Celebrates 300 Years of the Piano

Most of us made our way to the organ by way of the Piano. The Smithsonian's National Museum of American History chronicles the 300 year history of this instrument in "PIANO 300: Celebrating Three Centuries of People and Pianos." The exhibition's run has recently been extended through June 4, 2001 at the Smithsonian International Gallery across the National Mall from the museum.

A focal point of the exhibition is one of only three extant pianos made by inventor Bar-

tolomeo Cristofori of Florence, Italy in 1722. Other highlights include an Erard grand piano presented to Prince Albert by Queen Victoria, and Liberace's



Ellington.

"PIANO 300" features composers' manuscripts, tools, photographs, play bills, sheet music and other memorabilia in addition to 25 pianos for a comprehensive look at this invention and its influence on American culture.

With each new invention, the sound of the piano changed over time and each pianist has a distinctive style. Two listening stations feature recordings of several exhibition pianos as well as performances by famous pianists. Regularly scheduled public programs - including concerts, exhibition tours and short films - compliment the exhibition.

The Smithsonian International Gallery is located at 1100 Jefferson Drive on the National Mall and is open from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily. Admission is free.

of, and will lead, the full complement of 170-plus AGO Chapters in the production of the national PIPES SPECTACULAR! event. Four partner organizations are collaborating

with the American Guild of Organists to produce PIPES SPECTACULAR!: the Organ Historical Society; the Royal Canadian College of Organists; the Royal College of Organists; and the Virgil Fox Society. Each concert will require an admission fee, which is determined by the local AGO Chapter. Any proceeds, after expenses, will be shared by both the local Chapter and the national organization to fund AGO educational and community outreach programs.
